

## RESPONDING TO FOOD INSECURITY

Food insecurity has reached crisis and emergency levels across Somalia. Years of consecutively poor rainfall has left 6.2 million people in need of emergency food and livelihood support – this is well over half of the population. The situation is expected to deteriorate further as we enter the dry season. Levels of acute food insecurity and malnutrition will remain high in Somalia through to the end of the year, including 388,000 children under five who are acutely malnourished.


The Somali Red Crescent Society is present throughout the country, supporting communities to respond to the many and growing challenges they are facing. With IFRC's support, the Somali Red Crescent will help 353,000 of the most vulnerable people in Somaliland and Puntland.

With the upsurge of cholera/acute watery diarrhoea cases in late 2016, the Red Crescent has taken a leading role in the response efforts, including deploying a cholera treatment centre and mobilizing volunteers community education campaigns. Somalia has since seen a sharp decline in the number of cases.

## **Urgent actions**

- **Health**Mobile and fixed clinics in rural areas.
- Water, sanitation and hygiene
  Rehabilitation and monitoring of water points;
  distribution of water purification tablets, jerrycans
  and ceramic water filters; and hygiene promotion.
- Nutrition
  Nutritional screening and supplementary feeding for children under five.
- Cash for plowing

  Providing farmers means to plow their farmland.
- **5** Unconditional cash grants
  - Shelter
    Tarps, mats, blankets, kitchen sets and hygiene kits

133,000

15,000


people given access to safe water through rehabilitation of water points, water treatment and storage items

## **Funding**



IFRC is supporting the Somali Red Crescent through an Emergency Appeal that seeks 10,491,893 Swiss francs to help 353,000 vulnerable people in Somaliland and Puntland until June 2018.

"The drought has affected us very much. We lost 25 camels and 150 goats and sheep," says Fadumo. "We now have nothing. We depend on our relatives for food and other necessities."

The Red Crescent provided Amal with a high-nutritional, ready-to-eat peanut paste, called Plumpy'Nut, used to treat severe acute malnutrition for children six months of age and above. This will provide some relief to the family who is now relying on just one meal a day.

Thanks to the generous support of the global community through the Red Cross and Red Crescent Movement, we are reaching some of the most isolated, vulnerable and hard-to-reach communities with life-saving services. The IFRC Emergency Appeal is working with the Somali Red Crescent to ensure their short and longer-term efforts continue to meet the urgent needs of people now and their resiliency to future droughts.

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
